

Course Description of All Courses taken at Ajou University

Spring 2011

O Basic Design

: The goal of this course is to learn the basic skills of the practice in various forms. This course focuses on essential design elements such as dot, line, plane, form, color. Students will also study and apply the basic principles of design include balance, proximity, contrast, rhythm, and unity. Students are required to submit assignments in applying for the basic principles of design and to contribute to the critical dialogue and class discussion of assignments.

O Career Roadmap & linguistic Ability Improvement

: This course has two parts for freshman. First one is to build Career Design part. It is designed to conduct a self-directed university life through the setting of one's career roadmap and achievement goal. It is purpose for giving internal motivation to systematically develop the core abilities that freshmen students need to learn when entering society. Another part is Linguistic Ability Improvement. By taking this course, students can understand the importance of getting authorized English certification, foster essential abilities needed for employment and global competence and systematize self-managing framework which helps diagnose one's approved and target English proficiency levels

O Digital Media (in English)

: In this class, the student are taught about the basic concept of multimedia and the properties of their components. Especially, the class deals with the engineering issues about producing the multimedia components (mono-media), converting conventional media into digital forms, and integrating them into multimedia contents via programming language. By understanding the difference between conventional analog media and digital media, the students will get the basic knowledge about digital media content production. Also, they are taught about the engineering issues about production of digital media components and integration of these components a using programming language. The students are graded based on their understanding about the engineering issues and problem solving capability using a programming language.



O English 2

: Nowadays English proficiency is a prerequisite for survival worldwide. This course aims to provide students with the opportunity to improve their reading and listening skills in English which are essential for communicative competence. Students will also be able to increase their awareness of North American and other cultures by reading articles on a wide range of significant contemporary issues. The purpose of this course is to enable students to explore their English reading and listening skills with a variety of academic sources. This course will cover the following skills. Students will develop their ability to predict and identify main ideas, to accurately comprehend and interpret meanings, to paraphrase, summarize and to expand their vocabulary and grammar knowledge. By reading and discussing various contemporary topics, students will be aware of real world issues, and also nurture their multi-cultural awareness, which will lead them to realize the significance of working together for international issues. Students will learn listening skills which are prerequisite for communication, with a range of audio and video recordings, using a textbook, news and TV documentaries.

O French for trip

: In this course, students learn basic grammar and pronunciation through the textbook and AV materials. Focusing on practical conversations, the course will get students to have interests in French easily. Moreover, this course is designed for beginners.

O Seminar for Freshman

: This class is a kind of preliminary SIC(Student Initiated Course). Students will be trained to research and make something by themselves. Ajou University make students participate in UR(Undergraduate Research) program. This course may help senior students successfully accomplish the program. About 5 students will be one team to decide what they research(or make) and to make the output. Besides, group interview is also given to help each student's college life. This course does not confer credits to students but also judge by Pass or Fail

O Introductory Calculus

: Since this course is a preliminary step for those who wish to take Calculus 1, Students will learn trigonometric function, complex numbers, differential calculus and integral calculus.

Fall 2011

O Calculus 1

: This course provides the basic knowledge of calculus, especially differential and integral calculus in order to help students understand more advanced course of mathematics and engineering.

; Fundamental Theorem of Calculus, Definite Integral, Application and Techniques of Integral, Differential Equations, Parametric Equation and Coordinates Systems, Sequence and Series, Different Tests for Convergence, Power Series and Taylor Series.

Discrete Mathematics (in English)

Discrete mathematics is the study of mathematical structures that are fundamentally discrete rather than continuous. In contrast to real numbers that have the property of varying "smoothly", the objects studied in discrete mathematics – such as integers, graphs, and statements in logic do not vary smoothly in this way, but have distinct, separated values. Discrete mathematics therefore excludes topics in "continuous mathematics" such as calculus and analysis. Discrete objects can often be enumerated by integers. More formally, discrete mathematics has been characterized as the branch of mathematics dealing with countable sets (sets that have the same cardinality as subsets of the natural numbers, including rational numbers but not real numbers).

O English 1 (in English)

: This course satisfies one half of the basic English requirement for all undergraduate students. Focusing on the productive skills, speaking and writing, the primary objective of this course is helping students improve their overall fluency in English communication. Speaking lessons include task-based communicative activities, and are based on the textbook. Writing lessons, prepared by the instructor, focus on effective paragraph-writing skills.

Korean Writing

: This course aims to improve students' ability of writing and reading, which is needed for getting University education. Furthermore, the writing ability means not only the tool to use a language but also the tool to understand cultures and have extended knowledge. In this course, conceptual lectures and practical exercises will be conducted together. The students will learn from this course how to write a good sentence without making a grammar slip in Korean. At the end of this course, the students should be able to check their writing level and solve that problem by themselves.

O Physics (in English)

: Cover the whole field of science and to understand the specific knowledge of environmental sciences or engineering, concepts of basis physics are necessary. Using the basic knowledge of physics, students learn how to analyze the problems and the course provides broad general knowledge of environmental phenomenon

: Vectors and motion in one, two and three dimensions, Newton's Laws, Particle dynamics, work and energy, Conservation laws and collisions, Rotational kinematics and dynamics, angular momentum and equilibrium of rigid bodies, Gravitation, Oscillations and waves

O Physics Laboratory

: This course is linked with physics 1 so that the students can understand the fundamentals of physics and know how to make a laboratory report efficiently.

O Understanding of Storytelling

The root of cultural contents is storytelling. Therefore, the effective storytelling strategy is essential of successful cultural content. This course consists of case studies and benchmarking of successful storytelling in cultural contents. Students will grasp distinction genre of film, animation, TV drama, cartoon, game, character, theme park, festival storytelling by overall comprehension about storytelling background. This course is essential for development and creation of cultural content.

Storytelling is the conveying of events in words, and images, often by improvisation or embellishment. Stories or narratives have been shared in every culture as a means of entertainment, education, cultural preservation, and instilling moral values. Crucial elements of stories and storytelling include plot, characters, and narrative point of view. In this course, students can understand historical perspective of storytelling and effect as a educational tools which make listeners become engaged. In addition, students are required to write synopsis for film.

O Women's Career Development 2

: Based on an in-depth study of 48 successful women, "Women's Career Development" presents an overview of women's progress in management and various fields. Integrating the new research with existing theory and data, it is both an incisive new perspective on the way in which women succeed and an excellent opportunity for those studying women's development in business and etc.

Women can learn their need for achievement; the comparisons between successful women and men; women and organizations, the development and use of power. Students who are women also discuss their most important

value in their lives. Then, they make plans for career road map and how to show their appearance attractively. Most of the time would be lectured by many experts.

Spring 2012

Animation Aesthetics

: We are familiar with fun stories. How to tell these stories people by using video instead of using language? This course is based on many ways to speak and express our thoughts by making video. Students learn how animation aesthetics such as light, space, time, motion and sound apply to make film or animation. At the end of this class, students can give their message effectively choosing animation aesthetics as a film maker.

O Croquis

: This course aims to improve students' ability of rapid sketching, which is needed to catch and recognize the pose of a person. Drawing, the fundamental skill to create motion picture, is to help students understand the structural feature of mass being drawn and express their feeling. Students need to nurture their describing, observing power and concentration ability. In this course, practical exercises will be conducted and students have to draw quickly in a limited time. The students will sketch by using hand and feet and use diverse technique such as curved line drawing, straight line drawing, light and shade drawing.

Computer Animation

: This course is a basic step of 3D animation curriculum. Students will learn Modeling, Animation, Texturing, Rendering in three dimensional environment. Especially, Nurbs Modeling and Polygon Modeling will be trained intensively. Students can understand the production progress of 3D animation. Students will use Maya® 3D animation software which offers a comprehensive creative feature set for 3D computer animation, modeling, simulation, rendering, and compositing on a highly extensible production platform.

O Korean history and the Development of Korean people

: This class tries not only to enhance the knowledge of modern history of Korea from the era of classical imperialism in the 1870s to the present but also to improve the students' critical analyzing ability on the period.

This course expects to allow students to gain basic knowledge on the features of contemporary Western civilization. Furthermore, this course stimulates students to think over what kind of meaningful implications the dramatic experiences in the West during the period have offered to contemporary Korean society as well. In reading lists, students will find at least one or two topics that intrigue their attention.

Reading in German

: In this course, students learn basic grammar and pronunciation through the textbook and AV materials. Focusing on practical conversations, the course will get students to have interests in German and European culture easily. Moreover, this course is designed for beginners.

Introduction to Cultural Contents Studies

: The word 'Culture & Content' is an unfamiliar term around the globe. People usually distinguish each content and call them 'animation', 'film', or 'music'. However, in the late 1990s, the ROK created the term that binds different genres together into a single word 'culture' and started focusing more on designing marketing rather than on production as in the past. Culture Contents refer to all the multimedia contents of culture and art conveyed in the formation and distribution of various digital media such as movies, games, animation, characters, records, broadcasts, mobile contents, web contents, and e-books. This course cultivates the planners, scenario developers, and entrepreneurs most needed for this field. The students will learn both the practical and creative skills necessary to work and flourish in this field and a full understanding of humanity as well.

Taekwondo, Korean martial art

: This course takes an aim at providing students with the opportunity to understand what the healthy life is through this sport activity. Taekwondo as a martial art is popular with people of both genders and of many ages. Physically, taekwondo develops strength, speed, balance, flexibility, and stamina. An example of the union of mental and physical discipline is the breaking of wooden boards, bricks or tiles, which requires both physical mastery of the technique and the concentration to focus one's power. Moreover, Learning high kicking and fast hand techniques, students will have ideas of appropriate sport cultures. Intensive training will be conducted, and skills will be evaluated.

Fall 2012

O Career Roadmap & linguistic Ability Improvement 2

: This course has two parts for freshman. First one is to build Career Design part. It is designed to conduct a self-directed university life through the setting of one's career roadmap and achievement goal. It is purpose for giving internal motivation to systematically develop the core abilities that freshmen students need to learn when entering society. Another part is Linguistic Ability Improvement. By taking this course, students can understand the importance of getting authorized English certification, foster essential abilities needed for employment and global competence and systmatizize self-managing framework which helps diagnose one's approved and target English proficiency levels.

Chorus

This course takes an aim at providing students with the opportunity to enjoy music. Moreover, singing in a choir, students will train the voice and deep breathing. They will singing together with harmony and enjoy diverse culture of music.

Imagination and Reality

: This course takes an aim at providing students with the opportunity to compare imagination and reality in literary works. Through understanding of comparative studies, students will learn how to understand literary works and movies from Eastern and Western based on the motif.

Introduction to China

: This course is designed to give students an overview of China. The course covers comprehensive features of China; geographic, history, society, culture, political system, economy, and corporation. By understanding these features, student will have broad knowledge of the continent to have understand and sense of international perspective.

Reading of Classics for Culture

: Knowledge and creative thinking are the basis for developing a good cultural content. While the "cultural content" is based upon "culture", the interest in the great books is the requirement for the people in cultural content field. The class will help student broaden their knowledge and deepen their thinking while the student read the worlds' greatest books.

Psychology of Interpersonal Relations

: This course will provide students with basic knowledge of psychology that is a field that focuses on the study of the human mind, behavior and interpersonal relations. Students learn basic concepts of psychology and apply psychological theory to real life and analyze phenomenon occurred between individuals and society.

In this course, the methods to overcome the problem related to the process of adaptation will be discussed. In order to keep the metal state health, students will learn how to understand themselves and the others, and how to communicate and live in harmony with the others. Moreover, marriage problems will be dealt for better understanding.

O European Contemporary History (in English)

: This class tries not only to enhance the knowledge of contemporary history of Western World from the era of classical imperialism in the 1870s to the present but also to improve the students' critical analyzing ability on the period. According to famous British historian E. J. Hobsbawm, this period is referred to as the age of extremes. This class pays attention to various aspects of the eventful period based on source reading and visual materials.

This course expects to allow students to gain basic knowledge on the features of contemporary Western civilization, and its impacts on the other regions of the world. Furthermore, this course stimulates students to think over what kind of meaningful implications the dramatic experiences in the West during the period have offered to contemporary Korean society as well. In reading lists, students will find at least one or two topics that intrigue their attention. Keep an important point in mind; As a upper-division(for juniors and seniors) lecture course taught in English, this course is basically designed for History or Social Science major students.

Spring 2013

O History of American Literature (in English)

: This is a survey course in the history of American literature. We will read major works of American literature, and examine the historical and cultural context of the works. The purpose of this course is to give students an opportunity to examine American literature and its historical and cultural context. This course aims to improve students' reading comprehension and discussion and presentation skill in English.

Introduction to Cultural Contents Planning

: This course enables the students to develop the planning ability by studying the basics of planning methodology in the development of cultural contents. In this course, the students will enhance their understanding of planning of cultural contents and learn the methods of merchandizing and utilizing the concept of one-source, multi-use. The students learn the general process and basic rules in making a plan, practice the ways of actualizing ideas, developing synopses and so forth, and study methods of securing and managing scenarios, schedule management, making up a budget and raising funds.

O Understanding British and American Culture (in English)

: "Culture is ordinary: that is where we must start" - Raymond Williams

This triple-purpose course is designed 1) to help them to prepare for other classes conducted in English, 2) to introduce American culture to entry-level English major students and 3) to provide them with analyzing tools so

that they learn to develop thoughtful and critical analyses of culture both verbally and in writing. The first goal of improving students' English skills can be achieved by encouraging students to participate in the class with various fun activities (oral reports, cultural content creations, group projects, etc) and disclosing lesson goals and discussion questions in advance. Students will have ample time to prepare for each class meeting. For the second purpose, students will have the chance to become a cultural critic, or cultural detective (whichever name, you prefer) by analyzing the signs of American culture and criticizing their hidden implications. This course will use many familiar cultural signs such as Superman, Britney Spears, Hip-hop, Nike, etc as lenses through which we observe contemporary American culture. Nevertheless, each sign was closely connected to a single cultural myth, called American masculinity. Students will trace the beginning, development and transformation of American masculinity. Theoretically, they will learn basic concepts of cultural studies and will apply them to understand the contemporary American pop culture. The apparently inescapable force of American popular culture will inevitably lead students to question our Korean culture as well. Towards the end of semester, we will consider the possibility of resistance and dissent, as exemplified in sub-cultures and counter-cultures, both historically and today.

Mystique of the Human Brain

: The cellular and molecular basic principles and mechanisms of nervous functions and the adaptations of animals to environments form the central theme: Membrane structure and organization; Membrane transport mechanisms; Physical basis of neuronal function; Communication along and between neurons; Sensory reception and their receptors; Mechanisms of secretion and hormonal control; Motor neuron functions; Brain functions; Behaviors; Neuronal integration of homeostasis. This course enables the students to understand human behavior related to brain In this course, the students will enhance their understanding of brain's structure and functions and learn the recent brain studies.

Visiting Museums

: This class consists of lectures about museum and visiting museums in Korea. Students can understand what is museum, history of museum, history of Korean museum and museum and cultural industry.

Spring 2014

O Practicing Contents English (in English)

: This course introduces students to English-spoken/written cultural contents such as movie, advertisement, cartoon, and computer game and helps them enhance their English communicative skills by listening to, talking about, writing about them in English. Students are required to not only analyze given cultural contents but also create their own products. Since the course is for the beginner to intermediate English speakers and organized

around 3-4 team projects. The course aims to have students play with and study genres of cultural entertainments such as movie, cartoon, commercial, and computer game and, by doing so, enhance their English proficiency.

Advanced Storytelling Practicum

: This class is designed to write storytelling which is centre feature of cultural contents. Students will try to write it for various forms of cultural contents such as films, soup operas, animations, games, as well as theme parks. The students will participate in writing scenario for films, games and animations, after studying fundamental elements of storytelling for writing scenario. Based on such a traditional storytelling genres, it is also devised to study storytelling for spatial contents and "Scenario Thinking" for planning product. It would be essential lecture for those who are willing to be scenario writer and director of cultural contents as well.

O Age and Spirit

: This course is made for the students of department of history to read classics of the East and West. Students need to read classics of the East and West for understanding of the East and West history and culture. Students will read the books written by famous philosophers, literary men, politicians and so on. Students should submit their impression of the book, and join the debate of impressions in the class.

Ethics of Contemporary Society

: First of all, this course covers Utilitarianism and Constitutionalism. How do we resolve conflicts among individuals, groups, and states? With these questions in mind, students in this course will learn basic concepts and major theories of Utilitarianism and Constitutionalism, the classical theory of Ethics and Meta-ethics on logical characteristic of moral statement and will compare and discuss diverse views on key social issues. This course deals with ethics and social problems of contemporary industrial society, with system problems associated with capitalism, imperialism, class conflict, racial and sexual discrimination, and institutional problems related to education, work place, environment, health, criminal justice, and welfare.

Science and Philosophy

: This course aims to survey some important theoretical results recently obtained in science and technology studies. We will carefully examine a number of concrete case studies studied by scholars from philosophy of science and technology, sociology of science and technology, and history of science and technology. The students taking the course shall learn various aspects of modern science and technology in the context of modern society. They shall appreciate how modern science and technology from the nineteenth century has come to manifest a number of its unique features, which can be clearly distinguished from the science and technology of

even, the eighteenth century. We will discuss in the class the significance of differences for proper understanding of science and technology of our time. The course will also encourage more interactions between humanities and natural sciences so that we can make well-informed and reasonable decisions concerning complicated issues which are so common in our multi-layered society. The target audience of the course is students studying natural sciences and/or engineering. The contents of the course will be stylized each term; considering the student's needs and backgrounds.

O Screen Tour on a Background of Korean Literature

: Going over the actual spot of the literatures can help students to analyze literary works and understand the writers and also it can raise the interest that the students have in literatures. There are many different kinds of ways to make a survey. In this course, financial situation and time are limited so the students need to make a field investigation once, for 6 hours. The slides or videos or any other materials will used in the rest of this course.

O Introduction to North America

: This course is designed to give students an overview of North America continent focused on United States area in particular. The course covers comprehensive features of US; geographic, history, society, culture, political system, economy, and corporation. By understanding these features, student will have broad knowledge of the continent to have understand and sense of international perspective.


